Nitrogen

Like other legumes, peanut plants improve the soil by adding nitrogen. Dr. Carver was very interested in helping poor southern farmers who were farming on low-quality soil depleted of nutrients after decades of growing only cotton and tobacco in the same soil. Dr. Carver wrote and distributed pamphlets showing how to grow peanuts to restore nitrogen to the soil through systematic crop rotation as well as uses for the excess peanuts.

Betty Boop

"Baby" Esther Lee Jones, originally billed as Little, Li'l or Lil' Esther, was a child entertainer who lived in Chicago, Illinois. She was initially managed by her parents, Gertrude and William Jones. Esther was a trained scat singer, dancer and acrobat who performed regularly at nightclubs in Harlem and all over the United States in the 1920s. In her act, "Baby Esther" danced, made funny faces, rolled her eyes, and—most famously—interpolated nonsense phrases such as "Boo-Boo-Boo", "Wha-Da-Da", and "Doo-Doo-Doo".

Sweet Potato Pie

Russell published her cookbook as a free woman living in Paw Paw, Michigan, as a fundraising effort to return to Tennessee, where she was born and raised. She kept a pastry shop and her cooking was inspired by French cuisine. Naturally, the recipes were primarily desserts and baked goods. A standard sweet potato pie was not included though a "Sweet Potato Baked Pudding" did give a nod to Southern cuisine.

T-R-U-C-K

The Patterson family owned and operated their business three generations strong. The horse and buggy company began in 1873. The company was producing 28 different horse-drawn carriage styles including buggies, backboards, phaetons, surreys, and the popular doctor's buggy. The company had 50 employees, and were able to manufacture approximately 500 horse-drawn carriages a year.

1915 the first "Patterson horseless carriage" was assembled. The company was later renamed to Greenfield Bus Body Company manufacturing bus chassis Greenfield Bus Body Company. Bus bodies were purchased by school boards in Southern Ohio, West Virginia, and Kentucky, as well as the Ohio Transit Company and used in Cincinnati and Cleveland

Shrimp

Maya Angelou

Waltz

Francis Johnson was born a free man and lived a free man, but this was America before the Civil War, a time when societal racism limited the activities of all African Americans. For most of his adult life, he lived in a thriving community of free African Americans in Philadelphia. Eventually, his music compositions centered on two traditions of Philadelphia high society. The first was evening entertainment, for which his string and brass bands provided cotillions, waltzes and quadrilles suitable for dancing and socializing at balls as well as private parties. He published 300 compositions between 1820-1840 and introduced Promenade concerts in Philadelphia advertised as "Musical Soirees" for all.

Carver's innovations earned him the friendship and respect of some of the most influential men of the 20th century, who regularly sought his advice and counsel. Soviet leader Joseph Stalin, whose brutal agrarian reforms resulted in a famine that killed millions, asked Carver to visit the Soviet Union in the 1930s to reorganize a series of cotton plantations. Carver, however, refused Stalin's invitation, most likely because of his unwillingness to leave his beloved Tuskegee University.

The Pulitzer Prize is an award for achievements in newspaper, magazine, online journalism, literature, and musical composition within the United States. Hers was a Pulitzer in poetry, specifically for a volume titled Annie Allen that chronicled the life of an ordinary black girl growing up in the Bronzeville neighborhood on Chicago's famous South Side. The Lynn Museum in Massachusetts

Matzeliger was born in Africa to a Dutch engineer father and a Surinamese slave mother. When he arrived in Lynn in the 1870s, he didn't know much English, but he did know how to make shoes. He'd spent countless hours watching lasters work, and had a notion that he could mechanize their movements. On May 29, 1885, his invention was unveiled, and demonstrated for the first time. Not only did it work, it changed everything. Factory production jumped from 50 pairs a day to 750 pairs a day. The cost of a pair of shoes made in Lynn dropped in half.

Within a few years, Lynn is the undisputed shoe capital of the world. 234 factories are churning out more than a million pairs of shoes each day.
